

WaterFest Photography Contest

at Shaker Village of Pleasant Hill

On Saturday, Sept. 5, 2015, Shaker Village will hold **WaterFest**, a free community festival offering educational and recreational opportunities about the sustainability and environmental preservation of our region's water resources, in conjunction with several community partners.

To highlight water features located in The Preserve's 3,000 acres, Shaker Village is opening a photography contest which will be on exhibit in The Historic Centre. A variety of waterfalls, creeks, rivers and ponds can be found throughout The Preserve's 37 miles of hiking trails, displaying a variety of seasonal flora and fauna.

The WaterFest photography exhibition will be seen by thousands of visitors to Shaker Village and help to raise awareness of the beauty, importance and care of water in The Preserve. This will be the first exhibition in a new series of annual public art programs. Help us make art and history at this National Historic Landmark!

HOW DO I ENTER?

- Any photographer (professional or amateur) of any age may enter
- Images may be digital or film (from any photographic device), but must be emailed for consideration
- Images must have been taken at Shaker Village this calendar year (from January 1, 2015)
- Up to 3 images may be submitted for consideration
- Images must be emailed to education@shakervillageky.org

In the body of the email, include the following information:

Name, address, phone number

Age

Location of photo

Name of each photo (if applicable)

Photographic device used to make photo (SLR, smart phone, digital camera, etc.)

- Deadline for submissions: **June 3**

- Winning submissions must be framed and ready to hang (winners will be notified of specifications)
- ***Winning photographs must be delivered to Shaker Village by July 11***
